Parkland School Division is home to over 11,500 students across 22 schools, two high school outreaches and a number of alternative learning locations. Here are a few highlights from across the division:

Expanding Learning Options

Our growing selection of Programs of Choice offers families a variety of optional learning opportunities that meet the diverse needs and interests of students while following Alberta's program of study. Existing options include French Immersion, the Maranatha Christian Program and Nature Kindergarten. Exciting new Programs of Choice include:

Virtual Learning (Gr. 1-12)

Virtual Learning is a teacher-directed program, supported by the staff from Connections for Learning, that allows students to work full-time from home using virtual learning tools and remote access to content. Virtual Learning is a full-time program requiring a full-year commitment.

Building Futures (Gr. 10)

Building Futures offers students a unique, immersive one-year experience that allows them to step beyond the traditional classroom into an authentic learning challenge—building a house from the ground up. Through a partnership with Coventry Homes, students learn in both an on-site classroom, where they take academic courses taught by teachers, and then on-site where they become part of the home-building team.

Parkland Student Athlete Academy (Gr. 6-12)

The PSAA provides students in pursuit of high performance athletics with technical, theoretical and experiential opportunities, while keeping them engaged in a school community focused on academic achievement. Partnerships with local sports organizations allow PSAA students to choose from various athletic disciplines.

Strengthening Student Transportation

We operate one of the largest student transportation systems in the province, serving not only our division but Evergreen Catholic Schools, other neighbouring jurisdictions and some area private schools. Enlisting local bus contractors, we oversee 155 routes that provide service to more than 7,000 student riders. Our fleet travels over 19,000 kilometres each school day.

Transportation Services regularly reviews best practices to ensure safety and quality service delivery. For example, in summer 2021, the department will undergo technology upgrades to strengthen navigation and bus pass systems.

Assessing Academic Achievement

Our Annual Education Results Report (AERR) addresses the previous year's achievement of each of the Board's locally-developed goals and Alberta Education's Business Plan outcomes.

Traditionally, the AERR includes results from Provincial Achievement Tests (for Grades 6 and 9) and Diploma Exams (usually held in June), but these evaluations were cancelled in 2020 due to the pandemic. To produce an accurate and meaningful depiction of academic achievement for the 2019-2020 school year, we used a combination of provincial Accountability Pillar information, PSD's Capital Plan, financial data and feedback from stakeholders, the Board of Trustees, Senior Administration, Lead Team and the Council of School Councils. Embracing Indigenous Learning

Strengthening our relationships with neighbouring Paul First Nation (PFN) continues to be a priority, and together we are working to support Indigenous learners.

With the involvement of community and PFN Elders, we are creating meaningful Indigenous learning opportunities that connect staff and students mentally, physically, emotionally and spiritually.

In three schools, we embarked on a Stoney language and culture pilot with four PFN community members. We look forward to hearing from the children about their experiences.



In addition to creating school-based supports for First Nations, Métis and Inuit students, we are committed to fulfilling recommendations from the Truth and Reconciliation Commission of Canada Calls to Action, namely:

- 57 PSD created an Indigenous Foundational Knowledge Certificate of Completion and provides multiple professional development opportunities for all employees.
- 63. i Teachers in all grades are embedding the learning of treaties, residential schooling and Indigenous history into the yearly program.
- 63. ii & iii Staff are learning Indigenous protocols and best practices to support respectful learning of Indigenous history and are working with students to deepen intercultural understanding, empathy and mutual respect.
- 63. iv PSD school administrators are working to identify teacher training needs relating to the Calls to Action.

Improving and Creating Learning Spaces

Stony Plain Central Replacement School

Planning and preparation continue on the division's third brand new school in the past five years. PSD is excited to team up again with Marshall-Lee Construction Corp. on the project. They are the same contractor that completed the current Memorial Composite High School back in 2010. Construction on the new Stony Plain Central site is set to begin in spring 2021.

Woodhaven Modernization Project

In fall 2020, the new 3,000 square metre building addition opened to the school community for regular use. Expansion areas include a full-size gym and 16 classrooms, which is enough learning space to accommodate 400 more students.

The final phase focuses on renovations within the existing school building, with completion of the entire modernization project scheduled for September 2021.





Local impact of a global ordeal

The pandemic caused by COVID-19 presented challenges that most of us never imagined. From stringent safety measures and new protocols to temporary school closures and at-home learning.

Though times were strange and footing unsure, our commitment to delivering quality education endured.

Province-wide school closures created a landscape where online learning became a critical learning tool overnight. Teachers, administration and support staff quickly pivoted to provide meaningful, engaging and connective online learning experiences.

Our students, their families and community partners all adapted to learning in new ways, in new environments and were committed to making an effort to succeed. This collective persistence became a defining attribute across the division, especially during multiple transitions to at-home learning.

Even with the uncertainty of what learning would look like going forward, people from across the division held to our enduring priorities of resilience, exploration and community. We all made choices to ensure the best possible outcomes for our students and children.

Educational Options

At the start of the 2020–2021 school year, we offered four educational options to meet the needs of students and their families.

These options allowed parents and guardians to make informed decisions for their children and families during the pandemic.

Option 1

Return to in-person classes with additional health protocols in place to keep students and staff safe.

Option 2

Teacher-supported at-home learning, with an eventual return to in-person classes. Student remains enrolled at their designated school.

Option 3 - Virtual Learning

Teacher-directed learning that allows Grade 1–12 students to work from home via online learning tools and remote access to content. The program requires a full-year commitment to full-time at-home learning.

Option 4 - Home Education

Parent-directed learning with access to teacher support through the Connections for Learning campus.









2019-2020 **AUDITED FINANCIAL STATEMENT**

The Division allocates revenues in accordance with decision-making beliefs and guiding principles. As such, the vast majority of funding is sent directly to schools and distribution of funds is left to school-based leaders.

- Revenues over the previous year show a decrease of \$9,681,328 (-7.2%).
- Expenditures over the previous year show a decrease of \$9,579,163 (-7.1%).
- The cost of educating 11,600 students was \$124,943,328.
- \$96,419,091 (77.2%) of total funds (which includes Instruction, School Generated Funds and System Instruction) was spent directly on students in the classroom.
- The single largest classroom expenditure was for staff salaries and benefits. The average teaching cost was \$111,888 (\$100,488 excluding Alberta Teachers' Retirement Fund costs).
- The cost for Board and System Administration was below the province's cap of 3.6% of expenditures for a total of \$3,954,813 (3.2% of total expenditures).
- Expenditures to transport students to and from school amounted to \$8,358,721 (6.7%).
- The cost of maintaining and operating 23 sites amounted to \$16,139,349 (12.9%).
- Parkland's annual operating deficit is \$251,437 which primarily relates to a deficit in maintenance related to an increase in insurance premiums, and a deficit in transportation offset by surpluses in instruction and administration.
- The division had budgeted an operating deficit in the preliminary budget of \$416,042 or 0.31% of revenues. The deficit for 2019-2020 was \$251,437 or 0.20% of revenues.
- The total accumulated surplus from operations is \$ 5.813.220. This includes \$949.524 from School Generated Funds and \$943,769 that is unrestricted.
- Capital funding equated to \$4,761,121 (3.8% of revenues).
- Parkland's capital reserves amount to \$4,159,414
- Capital projects included Copperhaven School, the Woodhaven modernization, Stony Plain Central replacement school, modular classrooms for Prescott Learning Centre and Millgrove School, Infrastructure, Maintenance & Renewal projects and Capital Maintenance Renewal projects.
