Important Steps We Are Taking

Embracing Indigenous Learners and Communities

We are working to strengthen our relationships with neighbouring First Nations, while learning alongside and about Indigenous students and staff.

We continue to expand awareness of Indigenous languages and culture within our schools and are using tailored, holistic approaches to engage Indigenous learners, leading to a reduced achievement gap.

In addition to creating school-based supports for First Nations, Métis and Inuit students, we are acting to fulfill recommendations from the Truth and Reconciliation Commission of Canada, as applicable to education.

Improving and Creating New Learning Spaces

Woodhaven Modernization Project

In Fall 2019, contractors began the main phase of this project—adding 3,000 square metres to the building. The expansion will add a full-size gym and 16 classrooms, which is enough learning space to accommodate an additional 400 students. Barring delays, students will move into the new portion of the building in Fall 2020, allowing renovations to the existing school to begin.

Stony Plain Central Replacement School

Planning continues on the Division's third brand new school in the past five years. As of January 2020, architects are a third of the way into the project's design phase. Once the new site is completely serviced, construction will proceed on the new build with no disruption to school activity on the existing school's site.

Strengthening Transportation Safety and Processes

We operate one of the largest student transportation systems in the province, serving not only our division but Evergreen Catholic Schools, other neighbouring jurisdictions and some area private schools. In total, our fleet of 118 contracted buses provides service to more than 8,200 student riders, and collectively travels over 15,000 kilometres daily.

Affordable transportation options are available for those families who attend their designated school and live less than 2.4 kilometres from it, and for families who attend Programs of Choice. The cost to transport a student* for 184 days of learning is 95¢ per bus ride. (*Grades 1–12, living less than 2.4 km from their designated school.)

2018-2019 Audited Financial Statement

Parkland School Division allocates revenues in accordance with decision-making beliefs and guiding principles. As such, the vast majority of funding is sent directly to schools across the division and the distribution of funds within each is left to school-based leaders.

Revenues over the previous year show an increase of \$2,238,440 (1.7%).
Expenditures over the previous year show an increase of \$2,708,486 (2.1%).
The cost of educating 11,284 students was \$134,522,491.

\$102,952,496 (76.5%) of total funds (which includes Instruction, School Generated Funds, and System Instruction) was spent directly on students in the classroom.
The single largest classroom expenditure was for staff salaries and benefits. The average teaching cost was \$111,011 (\$100,792 excluding Alberta Teachers' Retirement Fund costs). This accounted for 70.6% of all instructional expenses.
The cost for Board and System Administration was below the province's cap of 3.6% for a total of \$4,338,226 (3.2%).

Expenditures to transport students to/from school amounted to \$11,806,545 (8.8%).
The cost of maintaining and operating 23 sites amounted to \$15,341,886 (11.4%).
Parkland's annual operating deficit is \$149,272 which primarily relates to a deficit in transportation partially offset with a surplus in instruction.

The division had budgeted an operating deficit in the preliminary budget of \$326,884 or 0.25% of revenues. The deficit for 2018–19 was \$149,272 or 0.11% of revenues.
The total accumulated surplus from operations is \$6,188,389, which includes \$959,561 from School Generated Funds and \$943,769 that is unrestricted.

• Capital funding equated to \$4,674,990 (3.5%). Capital projects included Copperhaven School, Centre for Education renovations, the Woodhaven modernization and Infrastructure, Maintenance and Renewal projects.

• Parkland's capital reserves amount to \$3,882,201.
