WELCOME ADCS

Through a unique partnership in Treaty No. 8 Territory with the Athabasca Chipewyan First Nation, Fort Chipewyan Métis and Mikisew Cree First Nation, Parkland School Division has assumed operation of Athabasca Delta Community School (ADCS) in Fort Chipewyan, Alberta. The Division is serving as the Interim Education Authority on a provisional basis while the three Nations work to form a Community Education Authority, at which time they will take over school operations.

Since assuming operations at ADCS (K–10), the Division has overseen finances, enrolment, staffing, school infrastructure, staff housing, technology and communication upgrades, programming and services for students. We also continue to build relationships with the community.



Programming

HIGH SCHOOL

PSD created a schedule that allows more flexibility and additional courses, including Career and Technology woodworking. Students also have access to the wealth of courses available through Connections For Learning.

LAND-BASED LEARNING

This environmentally-focused learning is derived from the expertise and knowledge held by members of the Athabasca Chipewyan First Nation, Fort Chipewyan Métis and Mikisew Cree First Nation. Land-based learning experiences at ADCS include:

- A chance to learn some of the skills needed to tan a real moose hide, as taught by an Elder/Knowledge Keeper.
- Support in going to Moose Camp for the opportunity to learn about trapping during the winter season.
- Dissection of muskrats and a talk about employment opportunities with Parks Canada after graduation.



Services for Students

APPLE SCHOOLS

The division received a maintenance grant from Apple Schools to support comprehensive school health at ADCS. Our Wellness Facilitator, ADCS Administration and School Health Lead will collaborate to promote health through the development and implementation of a comprehensive school health action plan.

DEVELOPING PARTNERSHIPS

PSD has a partnership with community service providers to support students requiring speech, occupational and physical therapy. Collaboration between school-based and community supports strengthens the services available to students.

FOOD SECURITY

The ADCS food program provides all students with a healthy breakfast, lunch and two snacks. The program is funded by Alberta Education, tuition agreements and support received from the Breakfast Clubs of Canada and Suncor Energy. The school employs two cooks to prepare the food, which is primarily sourced from the local K'ai Tailé Market.

HELPING HANDS PROJECT

The division received a one-year grant for Mental Health Capacity Building from Alberta Health Services.

The funding will support the continuance of the Helping Hands project, which promotes emotional, mental and social well-being for children and families in Fort Chipewyan.

Our division is home to over 12,400 students across 23 schools and a number of alternative learning locations.

Emerging and continuing trends and issues in education from our current education plan include:

The current education plan contains a new assurance element, which states, "Division staff will work towards understanding and eradicating current system inequities so that all staff and students feel they belong and are valued members of the community."
- An essential need to improve the success and well-being of our First Nations, Métis and Inuit learners and to bring Indigenous knowledge into our teaching practices.
- A continued need to address students' mental health concerns and improve workplace wellness.
- A response to the systemic revisions from the Government of Alberta to school transportation.

Westview School Opening in 2023-24

The Division eagerly anticipates welcoming students to Westview School for the start of the 2023–2024 year. The opening of Westview School is the culmination of the Stony Plain Central Replacement School Project, which began in 2018.

With construction complete, summer 2023 will see furniture and equipment delivered to the school, and existing teaching resources from the old school site relocated to the new school building.

The Board of Trustees unanimously approved the name Westview School from the recommendations put forth by the School Naming Committee. The Committee gathered recommendations and input through direct community engagement with staff, students, parents and the public.

Safe Travels

At Parkland School Division, student safety is our top priority. We operate one of the largest student transportation systems in the province and are responsible for safely busing more than 7,000 student riders. Our regional transportation system serves not only our division but Evergreen Catholic Schools, other neighbouring jurisdictions and some local private schools.

We have upgraded onboard cameras to capture video of cars passing buses when their red lights are flashing. We are also exploring the use of extended stop arms that spread over the opposite lane of traffic, giving motorists an additional visual reminder to stop. We have two extended stop arms on routes that travel busy highways, and we are looking to obtain and install six more in the near future.

Bus drivers play an essential role in our system and operate over 150 routes that collectively travel more than 19,000 kilometres each school day. Transportation Services works closely with local contractors to ensure every PSD route has a driver; however, we are not immune to driver shortages. We continue to collaborate with contractors to address and limit gaps in our system.

The Bus Status app complements our continuous need for clear and timely communication. The free app is integrated with the Bus Status section of our website and provides up-to-the-minute school bus information to families.

AUDITED FINANCIAL STATEMENT


Parkland School Division allocates revenues in accordance with decision-making beliefs and guiding principles. As such, the vast majority of funding is sent directly to schools and distribution of funds is left to school-based leaders.

The following figures are for the year ended August 31, 2022.

- Revenues over the previous year show an increase of \$2,319,092 (1.7%).
- Expenditures over the previous year show an increase of \$6,318,300 (4.8%).
- The cost of educating 11,944 students was \$136,933,097.
- \$104,331,469 (76.2%) of total funds, including Instruction, School Generated Funds and System Instruction, was spent directly on students in the classroom.
- The single largest classroom expenditure was for staff salaries and benefits. The average teaching cost was \$113,764 (\$103,772 excluding Alberta Teachers' Retirement Fund costs). This accounted for 71.6% of all instructional expenses.
- The cost for Board and System Administration was below the cap of \$4,355,793 for a total of 3.0% of total expenditures (\$4,162,029).
- Expenditures to transport students to and from school amounted to \$10,735,850 (7.8% of expenditures).
- The cost of maintaining and operating our sites amounted to \$17,560,270 (12.8% of expenditures).
- The Division had budgeted a \$2 million deficit. The deficit for 2021–2022 was \$324,518 (0.238% of revenues). This deficit reduction is primarily due to schools operating conservatively with the uncertainty of substitute and support staffing costs due to COVID-19 and supply chain issues that prevented central and school purchases from being received in the 2021–2022 school year.
- The total accumulated surplus from operations is \$8,640,554. This includes \$647,362 from School Generated Funds and \$943,768 that is unrestricted.
- The Division spent \$17,581,599 to acquire capital assets during the year. Acquisitions included \$3,779,501 purchased by the Division and \$13,802,098 purchased by Alberta Infrastructure on PSD's behalf.
- The Division's capital reserves amount to \$5,444,616.
- Capital projects included the modernization of Woodhaven Middle School, the replacement school for Stony Plain Central School, modular classrooms for Prescott Learning Centre and Millgrove School, the Prescott Learning Centre playground and Capital Maintenance Renewal projects.


